## *Chi Phi in China – Andrew Hendrickson '13*

This year, the engineering school at Bucknell organized a summer school trip to the country of China. The trip was called Engineering 290: Engineering in a Global and Societal Perspective. I was one of the lucky few that were able to go on this 22 day trip into the heart of Asia.

Our grand tour of the country took us to the major cities of Shanghai, Nanjing, Beijing, Xi'an, Chengdu, and Chongqing. These 7 different cities came in many different sizes with lots of different people. In the cities of Shanghai and Beijing, it was common for the Chinese citizens to have seen Americans before. However, in the others, we were not only constantly harassed, but some people were so bold as to ask to take our pictures. It was certainly different from what we experience on a daily basis in the United States.

The trip took us to all of the major Chinese cultural attractions including Tiananmen Square, The Great Wall, and Terra Cotta Warriors to name only a few. However, the main reason for being in China was to experience the engineering taking place in a Globalized world. This included numerous visitations to American companies such as HP, IBM, AECOM and GE, who do business in Asia. During these visits, we got to not only learn about the company as a whole but also experience some of the engineering taking place. In addition to visiting



these companies, we were also able to see many engineering marvels that have been built throughout the country of China. Yang Shan deepwater seaport, Three Gorges Dam, and the High speed rail network were only a few of the engineering wonders seen on the trip.

Another PLT brother, Yifan Ge '14, met up with our group in the city of Nanjing to travel with us on the trip. He and I were able to experience some of the night life throughout the country, including numerous bars. Luckily he is a Chinese citizen, otherwise ordering a beer would have been extremely difficult.

While visiting South East University in China, I spoke with a Chinese citizen who called himself Jerry. Jerry was a rather Americanized citizen who had a very positive view of western culture, and particularly the United States. In fact, Jerry was planning on coming to the US after his graduation in pursuit of the American dream. On several occasions during our discussion, he openly spoke against the Chinese government and what they do with regards to censorship. Jerry's view of the United States made me realize that although we grew up half a world apart, we were very similar.

My trip to China was certainly an experience to remember. Not only was I able to experience all of the cultural wonders of the east, but I was able to gain class credit doing it.

On the third weekend in July, the 147th Chi Phi congress was held in Atlanta, Georgia. The brothers of Phi Lambda Theta went in full force with six active brothers and two alumni that made the trip down south. Amongst us were Andrew Hendrickson '13, Scott Watza '13, Mark Paleafico '13, Robby Holler '13, Will Evans '14, Matt Argiro '14, Adam Andersen '10, and Tom Deans '55. The weekend was full of Congress sessions, committee meetings, and social events.

While in Atlanta, we were also joined by a recent graduate and former Alpha, Tyler Moyer '11. Tyler recently took a job with the Chi Phi national office as a field director. He will be in charge of traveling to a select number of chapters in the Northeast United States helping them with difficult problems they might be encountering. In addition PLT alum, Ben

Portman '07, was in charge of the 2nd annual Watts Gunn Memorial golf tournament. The tournament was held at the East Lake Golf Club and was a huge success.

Each active member and alumni that attended Congress was assigned to a random committee in order to delegate the essential issues and not waste as much time in full congress sessions. Some of the brothers were on committees that included Technology, Heritage and Traditions, and Accreditation. Issues and topics discussed ranged from items such as how to communicate effectively with the national office, all the way to revisions of the current accreditation system. Some PLTs played essential roles in these committees including, Tom Deans '55, who was the alumni chair of the accreditation committee. After the Committee session, the three chapters, including PLT, that were judged Accredited With Distinction conducted brief one on one training sessions for any chapter seeking to improve their scores on the survey. Chapter Alpha Andrew Hendrickson provided assistance on behalf of PLT. The Accreditation program was started almost four years ago in an effort to achieve more fairness in the evaluation process and to provide an objective mechanism for chapters to identify their strong and weak points and develop a plan for improvement. Brother Mike Orta, '06, was an active member of the Accreditation Committee planning group. Mike is now a member at large on the Grand Council, the governing body of the Chi Phi National Fraternity. Many of the items and plans discussed in these smaller groups were addressed during the congress sessions, with legislation being passed in the end.

Phi Lambda Theta was honored to receive four awards at this year's Chi Phi Congress. These included the Campus Involvement Award, Philanthropic Achievement Award, and Accreditation with Distinction Award. In addition to these awards, PLT also brought home for another year the Thomas A. Gehring Award for Chapter Excellence. We are very proud to be recognized at the national level for all of the effort and hard work we have put into the chapter and hope to continue this into the future.

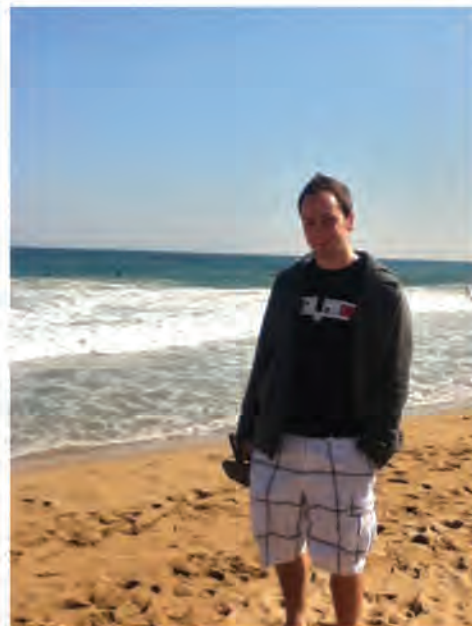


## *A Chi Phi in France – Nick Stetz '13*

While abroad in France I was able to live with a French host family, study in a real French university (Université François Rabelais), travel all around France and Europe and most importantly...eat lots and lots of French food. My host family consisted of a mother who was French, a father who was Moroccan, three daughters aged 9, 15, and 18, and of course Diva, their chocolate Labrador. They were the best host family I could've asked for: kind, caring, funny, excellent chefs, and very outgoing. I'm still keeping in touch with them as much as I can.

The university life at UFR is extremely different than that of Bucknell. The students barely pay attention in class, talk, arrive late, leave early and basically do everything and anything except listen to the professor. Believe me...it was a huge adjustment.

Luckily we had plenty of trips and experiences outside of the classroom in the city of Tours. Tours is in the Loire Valley, which is very well known for their goat cheese and of course their wine. During my stay we were able to visit goat cheese farms, see how the cheese was made, meet the goats, and taste test the finished products. On the same subject of taste testing, our professors also setup a wine tasting for us early in the semester. Needless to say, I think this was my favorite activity. I was able to learn not only which wines were of good quality, but also how to distinguish this in the first place.

While in Europe I visited 10 different cities. Five of them were in France (Tours, Paris, Périgord, Normandy, and Lyon). The other five included Dublin, London, Barcelona, Rome and the Amalfi Coast. It would take several pages to thoroughly describe in enough detail every other place I visited while abroad, so I'll pick out my favorite.

Out of everywhere I've been in the world, I'd have to say the Amalfi Coast is the most amazing and beautiful place I've ever been to. The bright blue sky, the crystal clear water, the green rising mountains and the gorgeous hot sun had me in awe. As touristy as it sounds, the pizza was actually the best pizza I've ever had. I was also fortunate to hit up the Guinness Factory in Dublin, visit my old hometown in London, see the Sagrada Familia in Barcelona and marvel at the wonders of Rome such as the Colosseum and the Vatican.

*Summer House Work – Charles Cole '14, Ryan Kelly '13*

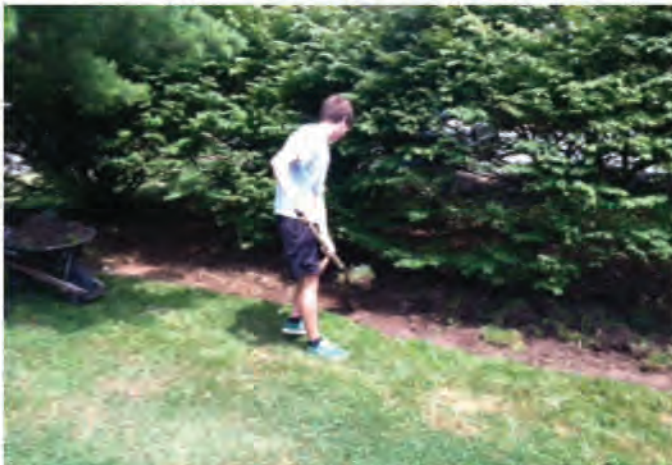

At the beginning of the summer, the entire house was edged and mulched. All the bushes surrounding this house were trimmed as well. After this was completed, focuses shifted to the front of the yard. The front sign that reads “Chi Phi Fraternity” was repainted, and the lighting for the sign was improved. Another improvement made to the front of the yard was adding a flowerbed to the area where the pine tree used to stand. After the flowerbed was finished, a new retaining wall was built in the front yard next to the porch. Along with these improvements, the front porch now has two new beautiful Adirondack chairs, which go well with the four Adirondack chairs that were recently purchased for the back porch.

The back of the house has had even more improvements made than the front. The burning bushes behind the parking lot were trimmed and mulched, and gravel has been added to areas where water runs from the parking lot to improve drainage.

Since the PLT Chapter of Chi Phi was reestablished in 2004, following nearly two years of being inactive, eight brothers have served in the position of Alpha: Ben Portman, Matt O'Rourke, Brendan Hamill, Adam Hinshaw, Matt Feder, Tyler Moyer, Jim Wilcox, and Andrew Hendrickson. And since 2004 the chapter has continued to grow in numbers, won the prestigious Gehring Award for outstanding national chapter seven times and gained recognition as a Silver Star chapter at Bucknell while consistently maintaining a chapter GPA of 3.4 or higher.

This year at Homecoming the chapter and alumni want to honor the seven former and one current Alpha by presenting them with the Distinguished Service Award, which will be presented subsequently to outstanding chapter leaders and named the President's Award. The former presidents will receive a special invitation to attend Homecoming. Though each has been an effective leader, they have never met together as a group. "This is a rare opportunity to honor these brothers who have literally turned the chapter around and set a standard of excellence that continues to this time," said alumni advisor Tom Deans '55.

The tradition began with Ben Portman, who had a vision about what a fraternity should be when he came to Bucknell. Finding existing chapters to be self-centered and not community and action oriented, he met with then Dean Chip Marrara and asked how he could start a new fraternity that would espouse diversity, community service, and academic excellence. Dean Marrara told Ben that a chapter which shared those values was now inactive on campus but whose alumni would welcome his vision and goal oriented approach. This new initiative was similar to earlier new beginnings for the PLT chapter: in 1946, 1973, and 1984, which were driven and inspired by like-minded leaders.

So it would be most appropriate if all former PLT presidents, called the Archon when the chapter was a local fraternity at Bucknell, and now Alpha since our affiliation with Chi Phi in 1984, joined us on this auspicious occasion, active President Hendrickson said. "We'd like all of our former presidents to respond via email and let us know where they are at the present time and to let us know whether they too can attend Homecoming this year to help honor these most recent leaders," Hendrickson added.
